


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
Councillor Curnow's Corner

When I last wrote we were in the throes of finalising Council's Long-Term Plan, our 10-year contract with the community. I'm pleased to advise that this was adopted in June and we are now well into year one of that plan. One of the things you might notice is that we are now operating under a new roading contract with greater auditing and accountability criteria. This should mean that our roads will finally see some improvements with better management of water tabling, more frequent grading and greater vigilance around pot holes. Please let me know if you have any comments about whether this is being achieved or not.

Another implication of the LTP adoption is an increase in rates for many of us. Some of this is due to the increase in spending that Council needs to better manage our infrastructure and cater to growth around the District. But for some, the rates increase has been higher than expected as a result of the independent property revaluations done last year. This can create a shift in the rates burden from one sector to another. In past years the shift was away from urban residential to farming (in particular dairying) as the higher milk price caused dairy land to increase in value sharply. This time residential land (in particular in areas such as Mangawhai) has increased significantly creating a higher rates increase in that sector. It's important to note that the revaluations are only done every three years, so the jump that some have seen will not happen again next year. On a happier note, it was my honour to Chair the Community Grants Committee meeting this year. We were able to distribute just under \$100,000 to a significant number of community organisations around the District, including a couple in Ruawai. The Committee looks forward to hearing how these projects go. You will also be interested to know that Council has established a Climate Change Working Group. Our aim is to start a programme of communication with the many communities affected, with a view to explaining what is known now, what is not known yet and how we intend to fill that knowledge gap. Once we have that information we will all be in a better position to start planning, in partnership with the affected communities, what actions will need to be taken and how they might be funded. We are under no illusions that this will be a quick or easy task. But we must start the work. Council is planning to hold a public meeting in October in Ruawai on this matter. Finally, Council's new Chief Executive, Louise Millar, starts at the end of September. It

has been an unsettled time for Council which I hope is now coming to a close. I look forward to working with Louise. I know she is keen to get to know the communities of our District, so you should have the opportunity to meet her soon. Mary was born at Te Kopuru, only daughter of Jack and Ena Nichols, and sister to Alfred and Norm. Growing up on the Golden Mile in Naumai on the family farm, Mary enjoyed the country life and nurtured a life-long love for animals, large or small. She was educated in Ruawai and happily participated in sports and all the usual school activities, bravely overcoming the difficulties of being born with an incurable condition called Lymphedema, which made her left arm very swollen and heavy. When her school years were finished, Mary stayed home to care for her terminally ill mother, beginning a career of helping and serving others. After her mother's death, Mary joined the staff at Ruawai College, and soon became affectionally known as "the kind lady who did the accounts." She was a highly valued member of the administration team for many years before retiring to take up a less stressful job at Ruawai Farm Supplies. When she wasn't working, Mary would be a familiar sight out and about walking, or clipping the hedge and mowing her lawn - her favourite hobby! Mary was a very active member of her Church community, living out her life's ambition to honour the Lord and help people. She excelled in both and will be fondly remembered for her unique personality and unfailing kindness. After being a part of our community for 80 years, 4 months and 8 days, Mary has definitely earned her place in the history of Ruawai. May she rest in peace and rise in glory.

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The Great Alone by Kristin Hannah



New Veterinary Clinic

Following is a letter from Sandy Brown and a couple of architectural drawings about the planned new Veterinary Clinic.

Otamatea Veterinary Club Inc.

Trading as: The Vet Centre

Jo Wessel has requested that we provide an update as to the proposed new build in Ruawai Township of our new clinic.

When we presented to the Ruawai members our plans we indicated that we could expect a commencement to the project after winter and hopefully we would be in the building before next winter. I am not sure this will be the case now as delays seem to litter such projects and all anecdotal information indicates constant hiccups throughout such projects.

We have pretty much refurbished the existing shed and power has been installed. This will provide the power source for the building of the new clinic. Again a delay here as the power at the pillar is only single phase even though the site is zoned commercial, hence another six week delay.

Fowler Homes will organise the build and Mike Bellamy our chairman will liaise with Wayne from Fowler homes after I leave the Club.

The final plans are completed and structural engineering plans have been drafted as well.

The shed will act as bulk storage and two bays will be fitted out to facilitate equine work. Once the clinic has been built we will remove the eastern wooden boundary fence to allow access to the clinic and shed more readily.

The accompanying plan is the basic layout of the building, with the clinical area replicating that of the Mangawhai clinic. This design however includes a far larger storage, office and lunch room facility and will hopefully future proof the clinic for the foreseeable future.



The placement of the clinic within the section boundaries will be determined by driveway access and waste disposal.

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Kaipara Kumara building Plans

Later in 2018, construction of a new building at Kaipara Kumara Ltd is going to commence. The new building will include brand new staff amenities, an open plan kitchen, staff training and socialising area, along with an office admin. area and reception. The new building will be approximately 600 sqm and be situated near the southern wall of Kaipara Kumara and opposite the Ruawai Bowling Club adjacent to Reeves Street. The team at Kaipara Kumara are looking forward to seeing the project come to fruition – after a couple of years in the planning. They are pleased to announce that Ringrose Construction Ltd are the chosen builders, and Cole will play a chief role in project management of the job. Local contractors are going to be utilised such as SR Wrathall Welding Services, Glen Jenyns Contracting and C&C Contract Electrical. To make way for the new building and new staff parking area, three of the Phoenix palms that run down parallel to Reeves St (and closest to the river end) are going to be removed. The remaining four palms are going to be trimmed and tidied up. This is going to go ahead in the last week of September. 
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Ruawai Tokatoka War Memorial Hall

The crane the group are standing in front of was in a secured area and not operating at the time the children visited.


Kindergarten manager Chanelle McLaughlin did a wonderful job coordinating this field trip and a big thank you to Ruawai College for loaning their minivan.

Memorial Service for Adrian Raymond Thomas and a tribute to Christopher John Robinson.

On Wed 22nd August, a service was held at the Ruawai College to honour the return of trooper Adrian Thomas. There was also a tribute to Chris Robinson who was killed in a training accident in New Zealand. Adrian was killed in action in 1956, in Malaysia. Adrian spent most of his younger days growing up on a dairy farm in Ruawai and attended Ruawai District High School. At the age of 16 on Jan. 1951 he enlisted in the regular force cadets, graduating in 1952 as a signaller with the Northern districts Signal Squadron. However in 1954 Adrian came back home to run the family farm due to his dad becoming ill. In 1955 he re-enlisted with the Army in the SAS (Special Air Service) and was posted to Malaysia as a trooper. Adrian excelled at boxing, athletics, cricket and rugby. After his death, the NZSAS provided the A.R. Thomas memorial trophy which was awarded annually to the most outstanding sportsman of the year at the regular force cadet's school in Waiouru.

The service started with the Ruawai College Kappa Hakka group welcoming Adrian into the school with a rousing Hakka. This continued on with the rest of the students inside the hall taking up the Hakka as well while Adrian was carried down the hall. The Hakka was so powerful that it sent shivers up your spine, it was so fantastic, and the students really put their heart and soul into it. There was a welcome and Waiatas, followed by a eulogy by Adrian's niece, Kiriana. The song 'Ruawai' was then performed by Ruawai Primary School Choir and ukuleles. The children sang it beautifully and there were a few tears to be seen in the

audience. Dave Hall had the honour of speaking about Chris Robinson. Adrian's brother, Paul spoke to the people who had gathered, thanking everyone for their attendance and a few snippets of his brother's life. Adrian was carried out by the Ruawai College students, while "How Great Thou Art" was being sung. This was soon drowned out by the College Students Hakka which once again was so powerful it blew you away. After people caught up over a cup of tea and exchanging stories, it was over to the cenotaph to unveil Chris Robinson's Plaque. This too was touching, surrounded by friends and family and, with the hearse carrying Adrian's coffin alongside, it was a great moment. This service was a pleasure to attend and was very moving. Thank you to the Thomas and Robinson families for allowing us to share in their day.

Learning Through Play

Ruawai Primary School is in its third year of trialling their play-based learning programme and principal Curtis Gaylor says the results have been encouraging. This method of teaching uses play as the context for learning and allows students to discover, explore and solve problems in their own way with encouragement and support from the teacher. Mr. Gaylor says that children today have fewer opportunities to play and be active than in the past. "There is less time spent exploring the natural world, less time 'doing their own thing,' fewer opportunities to take risks and problem-solve. There is more time in supervised, protected and confining activities that put boundaries on learning and creativity. This is why we value our Discovery – Play-

based sessions. Our vision is to ‘Develop and nurture individual learners who are engaged, connected and ever-growing.’ A play-based curriculum can help us achieve this and our intention is to continue to embed this type of learning throughout our curriculum.” Lead teacher Denise Hewetson says play is an essential part of children's social, emotional, physical and cognitive development. “For many teachers and parents, play has attracted a negative time-wasting connotation but in reality, play is a vital part of every child’s development. It allows them to test ideas, work through uncertainties, explore social interactions and make sense of the world around them. “Play has no predetermined outcome or time limit. It is not about an end product but about a process. It’s the exploration of ideas that is crucial. Play is children’s work.”




The Art Studio .

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
A quick update on what's been happening in the local property market – first rural, then residential. Below is a graph of Grazing and Finishing farm sales in Kaipara District over the past twelve months. I have compiled a full set of graphs for both dairy and grazing farms comparing sale price with rateable values, per kilo milk solids and per hectare – if you would like to receive these by email please let me know. Currently there is a shortage of good quality listings in the market and there is good demand especially for grazing, finishing and dairy support country. This is being driven partly by M.bovis as dairy farmers seek to make their business a self-contained enterprise by purchasing a run-off.

The Residential Market

There have been fewer sales of residential properties this year compared to a couple of years ago. However, the average sale price has lifted from \$166,000 to \$230,000 over that three-year period. There are very few residential properties on the market at present so if you are thinking of selling give me a call now, because the lack of competition makes this month a great time to list.
